

Thoughts from the Rectory ...

Dear friends of St. John the Evangelist,

With leaves dropping and days shortening, Creation is giving us its signs of closing time. The seasons of budding spring and vibrant summer are entering those of chilling autumn and slumbering winter. In natural life, we recognize the passage of time, beginnings and ends.

So too in human life and liturgical life. As in natural creation, so does human life experience its beginnings and ends. In birth and in death, and in the passing time between, we mature in life, grow in wisdom, perfect in love. It is in the gift of time that we practice the things of eternity.





Welcome Bishop-Elect Bill Byrne!



Pope Francis has named Father William D. Byrne, a priest of the Archdiocese of Washington, D.C., as the 10th bishop of Springfield. The announcement was made today, Oct. 14, in Washington D.C. by Archbishop Christophe Pierre, U.S. papal nuncio.

Bishop-elect Byrne was born Sept. 26, 1964. A native of Washington, D.C., he is the youngest of eight children of Mary (Largent) Byrne and the late Dr. William Byrne, a thoracic and cardiovascular surgeon who passed away in 2011.

As a youth, the bishop-elect attended Mater Dei School in Bethesda, Md,. went on to Georgetown Preparatory School in Rockville, Md. and completed his undergraduate studies at the College of the Holy Cross in Worcester, Mass. He then taught for three years at Mater Dei before being accepted as a seminarian for the Archdiocese of Washington, D.C.

He studied at the Pontifical North American College in Rome, completing his licentiate in sacred theology from Pontifical University of St. Thomas Aquinas (Angelicum) and was ordained in 1994 by Cardinal James A. Hickey.

Bishop-elect Byrne's ministry also includes service on the Archdiocese of Washington's Vocations Team (1998), Formation Board (2002-present), Priest Council (2003-2006), Priest Personnel Board (2006-2009), and Archdiocesan Administrative Board (2009-2015). He also served on the board of directors of St. Ann's Infant and Maternity Home, Catholic Youth Organization, and Redemptoris Mater Seminary, as well as the advisory board of the Lay Leadership Institute.

In 2007, he gave the homily to 20,000 Catholic youth and their leaders gathered at the Verizon Center for the annual Mass and Rally for Life which each year precedes the Annual March for Life in Washington D.C.

Bishop-elect Byrne is a popular columnist and YouTube personality, with his series "Five Things" highlighting five life hacks, prayer starters, or spiritual meditations to help people to grow closer



to God and appreciate the small — but vital —things in life. The series was so popular that it has been developed into a book, *Five Things with Fr. Bill*, which is being released tomorrow, Oct. 15 by Loyola Press.

Bishop-elect Byrne will be ordained and installed as the 10th Bishop of Springfield on December 14, 2020 at St. Michael's Cathedral on State Street in Springfield. He will shepherd a diocese comprising of 79 parishes and seven missions located in Berkshire, Franklin, Hampden, and Hampshire counties, and a Catholic population of 164,799.

A Brief Catechism for Catholic Voters

A six-week series of Questions and Answers to Prepare the Catholic Voter

WHAT IF ALL THE CANDIDATES FROM WHOM I HAVE TO CHOOSE ARE PRO-ABORTION? DO I HAVE TO ABSTAIN FROM VOTING AT ALL? WHAT DO I DO?

Obviously, one of these candidates is going to win the election. Thus, in this dilemma, you should do your best to judge which candidate would do the least moral harm. However, as explained in question 5 above, you should not place a candidate who is pro-capital punishment (and anti-abortion) in the same moral category as a candidate who is pro-abortion. Faced with such a set of candidates, there would be no moral dilemma, and the clear moral obligation would be to vote for the candidate who is pro-capital punishment, not necessarily because he is pro-capital punishment, but because he is anti-abortion.

Is not the Church's stand that abortion must be illegal a bit of an exception? Does not the Church generally hold that government should restrict its legislation of morality significantly?

The Church's teaching that abortion should be illegal is not an exception. St. Thomas Aquinas put it this way: "Wherefore human laws do not forbid all vices, from which the virtuous abstain, but only the more grievous vices, from which it is possible for the majority to abstain; and chiefly those that are to the hurt of others, without the prohibition of which human society could not be maintained: thus human law prohibits murder, theft and such like.". Abortion qualifies as a grievous vice that hurts others, and the lack of prohibition of this evil by society is something by which human society cannot be maintained. As Pope John Paul II has emphasized, the denial of the right to life, in principle, sets the stage, in principle, for the denial of all other rights.



The Church honors this day as a solemn day for all souls in purgatory who are being cleansed before entering Heaven.



The state legislature has extended the session until January 5th, 2021. Please remind the members of the Joint Committee on Judiciary that you **oppose** the **expansion of abortion** in Massachusetts. Please call the Committee at 617-722-2396 and let them know you are **opposed** to H3320 and S1209 – the ROE legislation. Every telephone call helps!

Remember these bills would remove:

- The requirement that young girls obtain consent before an abortion
- •The requirement that efforts be made to save a living baby who survives abortion
- •The requirement that late term abortions be performed in hospitals
- ·And the bills would allow abortion on demand for all nine months of pregnancy.

THE PASTORAL COUNCIL

Can. 511 In every diocese and to the extent that pastoral circumstances suggest it, a pastoral council is to be constituted which under the authority of the bishop investigates, considers, and proposes practical conclusions about those things which pertain to pastoral works in the diocese.

Can. 512 §1. A pastoral council consists of members of the Christian faithful who are in full communion with the Catholic Church—clerics, members of institutes of consecrated life, and especially laity—who are designated in a manner determined by the diocesan bishop.

- §2. The Christian faithful who are designated to a pastoral council are to be selected in such a way that they truly reflect the entire portion of the people of God which constitutes the diocese, with consideration given to the different areas of the diocese, social conditions and professions, and the role which they have in the apostolate whether individually or joined with others.
- §3. No one except members of the Christian faithful outstanding in firm faith, good morals, and prudence is to be designated to a pastoral council.

Can. 513 §1. A pastoral council is constituted for a period of time according to the prescripts of the statutes which are issued by the bishop.

§2. When the see is vacant, a pastoral council ceases.

Can. 514 §1. A pastoral council possesses only a consultative vote. It belongs to the diocesan bishop alone to convoke it according to the needs of the apostolate and to preside over it; it also belongs to him alone to make public what has been done in the council.

§2. The pastoral council is to be convoked at least once a year.

Can. 536 §1. If the diocesan bishop judges it opportune after he has heard the presbyteral council, a pastoral council is to be established in each parish, over which the pastor presides and in which the Christian faithful, together with those who share in pastoral care by virtue of their office in the parish, assist in fostering pastoral activity.

§2. A pastoral council possesses a consultative vote only and is governed by the norms established by the diocesan bishop.

SAINT JOHN THE EVANGELIST PASTORAL COUNCIL 2020 ELECTION INFORMATION

The Pastoral Council has worked to identify the many ministries and activities in our parish. With open lines of communication between our pastor, the pastoral council, our pastoral commissions, and the various groups we all share in coordinating activities within the parish. In the spirit of cooperation we hope to work together to build a strong, welcoming spirit within our parish that will foster even greater participation in our community.

To that end, we are looking for parishioners who would give of their time and leadership talents to help our pastor in his administration of the some sixty ministries and activities in the parish. We encourage members of these groups to consider nomination to the council as well as those who would represent the parish at-large.

Nominees must be 18 years old, having received the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, and Holy Eucharist), registered and active in the Parish, who are outstanding in firm faith, good morals, and prudence.

A nomination form is found below. Upon filling it out you can place it in the basket or turn in into the Parish Office. You may also contact the Parish Office by telephone or email with a nomination. Nominations will remain open through Monday, November 2nd.

"Let the spiritual shepherds recognize and promote the dignity as well as the responsibility of the laity in the Church. Let them willingly employ their prudent advice. Let them confidently assign duties to them in the service of the Church, allowing them freedom and room for action. Further, let them encourage lay people so that they may undertake tasks on their own initiative. Attentively in Christ, let them consider with fatherly love the projects, suggestions and desires proposed by the laity. However, let the shepherds respectfully acknowledge that just freedom which belongs to everyone in this earthly city

A great many wonderful things are to be hoped for from this familiar dialogue between the laity and their spiritual leaders: in the laity a strengthened sense of personal responsibility; a renewed enthusiasm; a more ready application of their talents to the projects of their spiritual leaders. The latter, on the other hand, aided by the experience of the laity, can more clearly and more incisively come to decisions regarding both spiritual and temporal matters. In this way, the whole Church, strengthened by each one of its members, may more effectively fulfill is mission for the life of the world."
