

Thoughts from the Rectory ...


Dear friends of St. John the Evangelist,




Holy Water Available!


The tomb and Gospel of St. John

WHY IS CHRISTMAS THE ULTIMATE PRO-LIFE SPECIAL DAY?

We may not think of Christmas being a pro-life holiday specifically, but its message couldn't be any more about the value of life! God came in the form of Jesus that we might have life—spiritual abundant life. God's choice of providing that was through a baby—born into a situation where this start of life was a "stigma and a danger." Mary was taking a chance on God, continuing her pregnancy, Joseph taking a chance on a baby that wasn't biologically his, and together, they fulfilled God's prophesy, believing that what seemed like an impossible situation was actually a blessing and the will of God

When the angel Gabriel appeared to Mary with a prophetic announcement that she would give birth to a baby named Jesus, fearful thoughts surely flooded her young soul. Under Jewish law, single women who turned up pregnant were stoned to death in the public square. At best, she would be an outcast, divorced and unmarriable before she ever even wedded Joseph. If anyone can relate to the fears of women who face unexpected pregnancies, it's Mary. What if she chose, instead, to give in to the fear, the social stigma, the financial pressures or one of the many other reasons women choose to have abortions? What if she had decided not to respond to Gabriel's declaration with, "I am the servant of the Lord. May it be done unto me according to your Word" (Luke 1:28)? Mary had a choice—and she chose life. She chose to give birth to the Son of God who would take away the sin of the world.

What if Joseph had refused to take Mary into his home, even after it was revealed to him in a series of dreams how Gods plans would be brought to fulfillment? Joseph had a choice but decided to trust in God, to accompany Mary in her pregnancy, assist at the birth of the Messiah in a stable, flee with his family far from his homeland to protect them and lovingly raise Jesus as his own son until his own death.

Like our Blessed Mother and St. Joseph welcomed Jesus, we, too, are called to cherish and protect the gift of human life, at every stage, from conception to natural death, and in all circumstances.

May the joy of Christ's birth give us the strength to be more active in and aware of the pro-life cause in the new upcoming year.

HOSPITAL VISITS: HIPAA Medical Law restricts access to patient admittance information. Emergency transport of a loved one to a local area hospital does have a Catholic Priest in residence. Be sure to ask, upon admittance, for a Catholic Priest to visit you or your loved one for an emergency anointing if warranted.

HOMEBOUND MINISTRY: If your loved one is confined at home because of an illness and/or anticipating surgery, call the parish office to request a visit by Pastoral Minister, Francesca. She will bring the Sacrament of Holy Communion, as well as, inform Fr. Pierz and Fr. Hurley of the visit.

<u>FOLLOW UP VISITS:</u> Upon request by contacting the pastoral minister, a follow-up visit will be made to the home post-surgery and/or illness during the recuperation period.

HOLY COMMUNION FOR THE SICK AND HOMEBOUND: One on One home care visits have resumed since April of this year to the Sick and Homebound residents.

HELP NEEDED: In this Spiritually Filled Vocation, help is needed to bring Holy Communion to confined Catholic residents, Home visits or Nursing home visits. Contact Francesca if you are interested in this Highly Spiritual Vocation, a given from your heart of Spiritual Love, bringing Jesus, the Holy Eucharist, to those who cannot receive HIM without help from you. Francesca will assist you and train you personally. ALL CALLS ARE CONFIDENTIAL.

BEREAVEMENT: If you have experienced any loss and are in need of grief counseling, and/or your period of sadness is a prolonged process for you, do not suffer in silence. A bereavement visit may be prudent to help you understand Our Lord's words of never being left alone. Here at SJE, Fr. John Hurley and Francesca are ready to help you please call 786-8105 x105. 



SECTION 2: Certain Principles Governing Socio-Economic Life as a Whole CHAPTER IV: THE LIFE OF THE POLITICAL COMMUNITY

80. The horror and perversity of war is immensely magnified by the addition of scientific weapons. For acts of war involving these weapons can inflict massive and indiscriminate destruction, thus going far beyond the bounds of legitimate defense. Indeed, if the kind of instruments which can now be found in the armories of the great nations were to be employed to their fullest, an almost total and altogether reciprocal slaughter of each side by the other would follow, not to mention the widespread devastation that would take place in the world and the deadly after effects that would be spawned by the use of weapons of this kind. All these considerations compel us to undertake an evaluation of war with an entirely new attitude. The men of our time must realize that they will have to give a somber reckoning of their deeds of war for the course of the future will depend greatly on the decisions they make today. With these truths in mind, this most holy synod makes its own the condemnations of total war already pronounced by recent popes, and issues the following declaration. Any act of war aimed indiscriminately at the destruction of entire cities of extensive areas along with their population is a crime against God and man himself. It merits unequivocal and unhesitating condemnation. The unique hazard of modern warfare consists in this: it provides those who possess modern scientific weapons with a kind of occasion for perpetrating just such abominations; moreover, through a certain inexorable chain of events, it can catapult men into the most atrocious decisions. That such may never truly happen in the future, the bishops of the whole world gathered together, beg all men, especially government officials and military leaders, to give unremitting thought to their gigantic responsibility before God and the entire human race.

81. To be sure, scientific weapons are not amassed solely for use in war. Since the defensive strength of any nation is considered to be dependent upon its capacity for immediate retaliation, this accumulation of arms, which increases each year, likewise serves, in a way heretofore unknown, as deterrent to possible enemy attack. Many regard this procedure as the most effective way by which peace of a sort can be maintained between nations at the present time. Whatever be the facts about this method of deterrence, men should be convinced that the arms race in which an already considerable number of countries are engaged is not a safe way to preserve a steady peace, nor is the socalled balance resulting from this race a sure and authentic peace. Rather than being eliminated thereby, the causes of war are in danger of being gradually aggravated. While extravagant sums are being spent for the furnishing of ever new weapons, an adequate remedy cannot be provided for the multiple miseries afflicting the whole modern world. Disagreements between nations are not really and radically healed; on the contrary, they spread the infection to other parts of the earth. New approaches based on reformed attitudes must be taken to remove this trap and to emancipate the world from its crushing anxiety through the restoration of genuine peace. Therefore, we say it again: the arms race is an utterly treacherous trap for humanity, and one which ensnares the poor to an intolerable degree. It is much to be feared that if this race persists, it will eventually spawn all the lethal ruin whose path it is now making ready. Warned by the calamities which the human race has made possible, let us make use of the interlude granted us from above and for which we are thankful to become more conscious of our own responsibility and to find means for resolving our disputes in a manner more worthy of man. Divine Providence urgently demands of us that we free ourselves from the age-old slavery of war. If we refuse to make this effort, we do not know where we will be led by the evil road we have set upon. It is our clear duty, therefore, to strain every muscle in working for the time when all war can be completely outlawed by international consent. This goal undoubtedly requires the establishment of some universal public authority acknowledged as such by all and endowed with the power to safeguard on the behalf of all, security, regard for justice, and respect for rights. But before this hoped for authority can be set up, the highest existing international centers must devote themselves vigorously to the pursuit of better means for obtaining common security. Since peace must be born of mutual trust between nations and not be imposed on them through a fear of the available weapons, everyone must labor to put an end at last to the arms race, and to make a true beginning of disarmament, not unilaterally indeed, but proceeding at an equal pace according to agreement, and backed up by true and workable
