Dear friends of St. John the Evangelist,

Today, Holy Mother Church celebrates the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. Over the past few weeks we have followed the development of the Christian mystery that is God's salvific mission. Having contemplated and prepared through the weeks of Advent for the coming of the Messiah in glory and in time, we rejoiced in the Nativity of the Lord, that is, the birth of the Christchild; we lauded the motherhood of St. Mary in her divinely appointed and humbly accepted role as the Mother of God; and, we feted the revelation of Jesus as the visible sign for all nations, near and far, that indeed God saves.
